BREAKING NEWS: NEW BUDGET ADOPTED

We're supporting our young people, revitalising community spaces and advocating for sustainable transport, thanks to our newly adopted 2018/19 budget and 2018/19 – 2027/28 long term financial strategy.

Our 2018/19 budget supports a wide range of services and projects, while moving us toward a strong and sustainable financial position.

This budget was developed following a four-month conversation with the community. We received more than 250 written suggestions, so thank you to everyone who contributed.

Councillors considered all the submissions carefully and responded by funding some key projects proposed by the community.

You asked us for a youth space in Richmond, where young people can go to participate in activities and connect with their peers. This budget has pledged \$185,000 towards a space for young people in Richmond.

We're also providing \$15,000 to the Alliance for Gambling Reform. Pokies and other types of gambling continue to take considerable sums of money out of local people's pockets. We're committed to reducing the harmful impacts of gambling by supporting the Alliance.

Our town hall precincts have always been a great space where people can gather and participate in community life. Due to our changing demographics, we are looking into ways to revitalise these areas and have committed \$100,500 to exploring how we can make the space around Collingwood and Fitzroy town halls more welcoming for the community.

As an inner-city council, we strongly believe in sustainable transport so that we can reduce congestion, help our environment and ensure our community can get around safely. That's why we are committing \$10,000 to advocate to the State Government for greater investment in sustainable transport.

LEAPS AND BOUNDS COMES TO TOWN

Australian singer-songwriter Laura Imbruglia says "there's a certain brand of adrenaline you get when you play a great show that is pretty much inaccessible otherwise."

Imbruglia joins an impressive line-up of talent performing at our annual Leaps and Bounds Music Festival. The festival celebrates the abundance of live music venues in Yarra, their artists and their audiences.

Yarra is where almost all of my live music consumption happens.

"Yarra is where almost all of my live music consumption happens," Imbruglia says. "Melbourne's music community always seem to gravitate towards the 86 tram line (Gertrude Street, Smith Street, Queens Parade)." There are gigs to suit fans of every genre, age group and budget, including many free gigs. Imbruglia will be performing a free show at Fitzroy North's Tramway Hotel on Saturday 14 July, supported by Tasmanian brother-sister duo Bulls. "I'm really looking forward to seeing Bulls. I played a show with them a few years ago and they blew my mind," Imbruglia says.

Participating venues include the Corner Hotel, The Rainbow Hotel, The Gasometer, The Tote and many other Yarra landmarks. And as Imbruglia tells us, "Attending a Leaps and Bounds show is a great way to support local music venues, musos and fellow music lovers."

MEET THE STARS OF WHEELCHAIR FOOTY

Fast-paced, competitive and inclusive, the Victorian Wheelchair Football League (VWFL) is showcasing the next generation of footy stars.

The new league is made up of five teams, each linked to an AFL club, including Richmond and Collingwood.

The teams are mixed and include a diverse group of players with different levels of ability. Players range from the very experienced to some who have never tried wheelchair sports.

"I gave it a go, and it was lots of fun," said Yasmina McGlone, who plays for Richmond, "it's nice to be a part of something where you aren't your disability."

All of the players take part in joint training twice a week, building a strong sense of community not just within the teams but also throughout the League.

"It's more than a sport, it's a family," said Richmond teammate Judeland Antony, "when we play we have a game-face on but afterwards we are like brothers and sisters, we are very connected and take care of each other."

Along with this sense of comradery, the VWFL has helped players improve their health and confidence, and gives them a new sense of empowerment about what they can physically achieve.

"I feel I have achieved something that I never ever dreamed of. It gives you a boost of motivation that anything is possible in this world," said Judeland.

The games are intense and anyone can come along to spectate "the first time I watched I was on the edge of my seat," said Yasmina.

The League is managed by AFL Victoria in partnership with Disability Sport and Recreation in Fitzroy.

"The five AFL clubs involved have taken a leap of faith on the league," said Richard Amon, CEO of Disability Sport and Recreation. "They have welcomed the players into their clubs and provide genuine support."

FOOD FOR THOUGHT

Helen Sheppard is among 400 Abbotsford householders taking part in our weekly food scraps collection trial.

We provided Helen with a dedicated food scraps tub in November 2017 and she has been placing it out for collection each week alongside her other bins.

The tubs can accommodate fruit and vegetable scraps; bread, rice and pasta; seafood and meat (including small bones); dairy and eggs (including shells); and coffee ground.

"We have a little tub under our sink and when it's full it goes to the food scraps bin outside. It's just really easy," she says, "and it's amazing to see the amount that your rubbish reduces as a result."

Helen and her fellow participants are helping to reduce the amount of waste going to landfill. When food goes to landfill it generates methane - a potent greenhouse gas - so avoiding this is a big win for the environment.



Results from the trial have been encouraging, with around 50% of eligible households already using the service. Just as importantly, contamination rates have been very low, showing that residents are paying close attention to what can and can't go in the tubs.

The program will soon be expanded to include additional households, with some homes receiving mixed food scraps and green waste collection service. Learnings from the trial will help us improve our waste services for Yarra as a whole.

GOOD NEWS STORY

Sensitive Storytime is coming to all five Yarra Libraries branches. The program is helping children on the autism spectrum, and children with similar sensitivities, feel more comfortable and able to participate.

We are incorporating sensory aids to help children and carers benefit from regular storytime sessions in a more sensory controlled environment and without the crowds. Tools include a visual timer, schedule board with Picture Exchange Communication System (PECS) cards and a sensory tent.



After her grandson experienced the benefits of this new approach, a local grandmother left us the following feedback: "My grandson has ASD, and has excellent receptive skills, but limited spoken language. He enjoyed this session because it enabled him to participate more and the PECS Cards helped him feel more included and (able to) participate fully".

Sensitive Storytime has been made possible thanks to a training resource offered by AMAZE, the peak body for Autism in Victoria. We've been working with AMAZE to help refine the resource to help others run the program.

NOURISHING FITZROY

The weekly Meet and Eat at Fitzroy Food Centre invites community members to connect and learn from each other through food.

Participants get together in the community kitchen to cook a nutritious meal and then sit down and eat together.

"There's a social elements to cooking together that is different from just sitting at a table eating," said Peta Christensen, the Food Systems Team Leader from Cultivating Community who runs the lunches. "It can help create interactions and teamwork."

Volunteers run the lunches and are on hand to prepare the ingredients and help participants with the recipes.

Dishes are chosen with a focus on healthy, affordable, seasonal eating and



participants are encouraged to share recipes with the group, allowing them to get to know each other and experience different cultures through food.

Meet and Eat received one of Yarra Council's 2018 Annual Grants.


YARRA SUSTAINABILITY AWARDS

"We have developed a \$4 million, six-storey energy-efficient commercial development building in the heart of Cremorne," he said. STREET TREES, YES PLEASE

Each year we plant about 1,000 new trees in streets all across Yarra.

Tree planting is a long term investment with many benefits, including enhancing the appearance of our streets and helping to slow traffic to improve journeys for pedestrians and cyclists.

There are also significant environmental benefits, as trees play an important role in cooling and filtering and provide habitat for native wildlife.

Yarra Council landscape architect Clare Lee explains that we are aiming to plant trees in streets without any trees or where existing trees require an upgrade. "Our primary focus is to increase street tree canopy cover and provide a healthy, diverse tree population which will cope with predicted climatic change." Many of our residents are passionate about the need for street trees in their neighbourhoods, including Princes Hill's Peter Kane. "The appearance and coolness of our street is essential to its enjoyment and value," he says.

"By planting more trees in Yarra streets, we're increasing their value through beautification, reducing summer temperatures and providing the opportunity to walk in the shade."

NEW TRIAL AIMS TO SAVE LIVES

The State Government is trialling a medically supervised injecting room at North Richmond Community Health (NRCH) in Lennox Street, Richmond.

This location has been selected because drugs of dependence are frequently bought and publically injected in the surrounding area. The new facility will provide health services, reduce public injecting and aims to reduce the number of discarded syringes in public places.

Yarra Council has long supported a harm minimisation approach, which is widely accepted as best practice in reducing the impacts of illicit drug use. Supervision greatly reduces the likelihood of overdose-related deaths.

The centre is managed by NRCH. Yarra Council is working closely with the State Government, Victoria Police, NRCH and other frontline agencies to manage any impacts on local amenity.

RATES NOTICES ON THE WAY

Yarra property owners will be receiving rates notices in August. It's important to remember that the 2.25% rate cap applies only to the overall amount of money that Council is receiving from rates.

Individual properties will experience rate increases that are higher or lower than 2.25% due to property valuations and other factors. New developments and rising property values do not result in increased rate revenue for Council.
