

MESSAGE FROM THE MAYOR



Council remain strong supporters of North Richmond **Community Health's medically** supervised injecting facility trial. I recently caught up with the trial's medical director, Dr Nico Clark, to talk about this ground-breaking facility.

The supervised injecting trial is already saving lives, with the safe management of more than 1,130 overdoses. If these incidents had taken place on the streets, they could well have ended in tragedy. We're also very encouraged by the hundreds of clients asking for advice on testing and treatment options.



MARKET LEADERS

Pay a visit to Gleadell Street in Richmond on a Saturday morning to explore a bustling market. You'll find everything from fruits, vegetables and flowers, to bread, poultry and other gourmet treats. Produce is fresh, seasonal and locally grown. It's one of Melbourne's oldest and most loved markets.

Lionel Tata sells seafood from a caravan he brings to the market each week. "All of my fish is Australian, a couple of things might come out of New Zealand," he says. "I fillet it in front of everyone so that they can see that it's nice and fresh."

"My fruit is totally natural," says Bruno Delgrosso, who sells his fruit grown in Red Hill at the markets. "It's like it would grow in your backyard so we don't use chemical irrigation, growth regulators, nothing's waxed... it's all grown natural with the climate."

Bill Duff, who sells eggs and honey, sources his products from the Yarra Valley. "The honey that I get all comes from an organic area, it's cold pressed and I can guarantee there's no additives."

Produce sold at the market is very affordable, so it's a great place to pick up your groceries for the week.

"I love this market because everything is really cheap," says Bruno. "You don't have to pay excessive amounts for your fruit and vegetables and there's just so much variety."

Many of the stall holders have been selling their wares at the markets for 20 years or more, and have developed strong relationships with the local community.

"The local customers are fantastic, they come back every week," says Bruno "I've actually seen people grow up from two years old to 30 here."

"I've been coming to the Gleadell Street Market for 60 years," says Bill. "The people that come here, most of them I know personally. It's a real community market and I think that people who don't know about it ought to come down."

HIGHLIGHTS FROM OUR NEWLY ADOPTED BUDGET

Our newly adopted budget for 2019/20 supports services like immunisation, childcare and kindergarten. It funds our parks, libraries and leisure centres, and supports our business and creative communities. It enables us to plan for sustainable growth, harness new technologies, improve our network of roads, and much more.

The budget drives our vision to become a more sustainable city. Having moved to 100% renewable electricity in our own operations, we are now empowering our community to make an even bigger difference. Our upcoming Climate Emergency Plan will help everyone in Yarra reduce their carbon emissions.

The budget also supports our response to the recycling crisis gripping our state. We are expanding our successful food and green waste trial to include a separate glass collection. This will improve the quality of recycling and reduce the amount of waste going to landfill.

We're continuing to build bicycle infrastructure like the Wellington Street separated bike lane to encourage healthy and sustainable transport. And we are expanding our tree planting and management program by 25%. The climate emergency is one of our biggest challenges, and this year's budget takes concrete steps to address it.

Other highlights

This budget includes \$31m for capital works, including:

- \$2.4m for upgrades to facilities at Ryan's Reserve and Kevin Bartlett Reserve, Richmond
- \$2.1m for community grants (supporting 150+ communitybuilding projects)
- \$1.4m for traffic and safety initiatives in Abbotsford, North Fitzroy and Richmond
- \$1m for trees throughout Yarra (a \$200,000 increase from last year)
- \$900,000+ for bicycle infrastructure across Yarra, including completing the bike lane in Wellington Street, Collingwood

A DECADE OF IMPROVEMENT

Community satisfaction with the services funded by our budget is at a 10-year high (independent survey by Metropolis Research).

Our community rated our overall performance as "very good" (7.3 out of 10) and our services and facilities as "excellent" (7.93). Our toprated services were our weekly garbage collection (8.74 out of 10) and our local libraries (8.67), both rated "excellent". All of these scores are well above the average for metropolitan Melbourne.

RATES NOTICES ARE ON THE WAY

Rates notices will be sent to property owners in August.

This year we have increased our total rate revenue by 2.5%, in line with the Victorian Government's rate cap.

We also increased our additional rate rebate for pensioners by 2.5%, bringing it to \$187.10.

Will my rates go up or down?

Your rates will probably change by more or less than 2.5%. This is because rates are also affected by changes in the value of your property and its value relative to other properties.

Does Council get more rates from new developments?

There are many apartment buildings going up around the city, but new developments don't actually result in extra recurrent rate revenue for Council.

This is because our total rate revenue cannot go up by more than the rate cap. So, as we get more apartments, the rate revenue Council requires just gets divided up amongst more people to contribute to achieving it.

LISTENING TO YOUR CONCERNS

Yarra Council has committed an extra \$300,000 for a new street sweeper and extra cleaning patrols to improve cleanliness of streets around North Richmond. This follows the Victorian Government's announcement of extra security and social outreach services. We are working with **North Richmond Community** Health, the Department of Health and Human Services, Victoria Police, and other agencies to ensure a coordinated response to community concerns.

INJECTING TRIAL ALREADY CHANGING LIVES

Yarra Council is a strong supporter of North Richmond Community Health's supervised injecting facility trial. During its first year of operation, the team has successfully managed more than 1,130 overdoses.

A new, purpose-built centre will open at the site later this year, replacing the temporary one. Prior to the facility opening, a number of people lost their lives to overdoses in public spaces. Medical experts selected this location for the facility because drugs were already being bought and injected in the area.

We recently spoke with the facility's Medical Director, Dr Nico Clark.

The trial has now been in operation for a year. What have been your biggest learnings?

Dr Nico Clark: One of our biggest lessons has been to understand why our clients have developed drug dependencies. More often than not, they disclose the most horrific, tragic personal stories, which gives perspective on how their drug use came about. Many grew up in situations where the adults caring for them had mental health and substance abuse problems of their own. The average age at which our clients began injecting drugs was only 16.

Many clients have started to take better care of themselves, in some cases stop using drugs, gain employment, reunite with their families, and escape situations of domestic violence.

Reducing the number of fatal overdoses is one of the biggest aims of the trial. How is this going?

In the transitional facility we currently treat an average of three overdoses a day. It's difficult to know how many of these would have been fatal, how many would have resulted in brain damage, or how many would have resulted in the person being assaulted while unconscious. Data suggests that ambulance call outs to the area have started to fall... in the hours when the room is open.

Realistically we need to look at a range of measures to reduce overdose, including scaling up opioid dependence treatments such as methadone and buprenorphine, distributing naloxone, training, and encouraging people to intervene if they see someone who might be experiencing an overdose, even if just to call an ambulance.

Supervising injecting is just one aspect of the trial. Can you tell us about the other services on offer?

Our clients have multiple and complex health needs that are not being met in traditional care. More than 150 people have been tested for hepatitis, with 40 people entering treatment. Through the injecting room service, more than 100 people have entered pharmacotherapy treatment already, with more than 150 clients also receiving referrals to other forms of alcohol and drug treatment services.

We also treat wound infections and test for and treat hepatitis, HIV and other blood-borne or sexually transmitted infections (supported by St Vincent's Health). We provide primary care including administering vaccinations (including the Fluvax). We support access to a range of health and social services including oral health care, drug treatment (with Uniting ReGen) naloxone overdose response training, and legal advice through our clinic with Fitzroy Legal Service.

CLEANING UP THE FORMER FITZROY GASWORKS SITE

Clean-up works have begun at the former Fitzroy Gasworks site at 433 Smith Street, Fitzroy North.

The Victorian Government is planning to develop the site with new housing, a senior high school, a sports centre and open space.

The site is contaminated due to its long industrial history. Works to decontaminate the land are being carried out by Victorian Government contractors Enviropacific, and are expected to be completed by mid-2021.

Trees have been cleared from the site, and the majority of remediation works

GOING PLASTIC FREE IN FITZROY NORTH

A coffee here, a takeaway meal there ... the amount of plastic packaging we throw out really does add up. And our landfill is running out of room.

That's why shops in North Fitzroy Village have pledged to go plastic free: to challenge the norm of single-use plastic and reduce the amount of plastic being sent to landfill.

Mitch Wells, from Billy van Creamy, is passionate about waste reduction, and has already found ways to champion more sustainable options.

'We encourage customers to eat in using our ceramic bowls, so they don't use plastic. We also give discounts for customers if they bring in their own take-home tubs', he says.

"It just makes sense – environmentally, commercially and ethically."

Billy van Creamy joins other businesses along North Fitzroy Village to encourage the community to bring their own containers and be part of the long-term solution. Plastic pollution is one of the largest environmental crises facing the planet. As part of Yarra's Proudly Plastic Free program, several North Fitzroy Village shops have committed to swapping single-use plastic packaging for non-plastic alternatives.

NO MORE ELECTRONIC WASTE IN YOUR BIN

Following a recent Victorian Government decision, you can no longer place electronic waste (anything with a battery or a plug) in your household rubbish or recycling bins.

This is to stop electronic items ending up in landfill, so we can recycle the valuable materials in these products, as well as keep the harmful toxins out of our environment.

If a household electronic item is broken and cannot be repaired, sold or donated – you must take it to one of the designated drop-off points in Yarra.

THE REVOLUTION IS HERE

Abbotsford resident Louis Boyle-Bryant is a Yarra revolutionary, participating in Victorian-first changes to how we collect the area's waste and recycling.

Since early June, Louis and his housemates have been among the 1,300 households participating in the Yarra Waste Revolution.

This trial has seen all participants receive a new bin for their food and green waste, and a mini bin or a plastic crate for their glass.

We're collecting glass separately so that it doesn't break and contaminate our general recycling and turning it into new glass products.

And we're collecting food waste, processing it to reduce emissions, and turning it into nutritious compost. This will reduce the amount of waste we send to landfill by up to 50%.

We've also made changes to what can be recycled in the traditional recycling bin, only collecting specific items that we know can be recycled in Australia.

We send far too much waste to landfill, so the more we can reduce or repurpose the better.

For Louis and his housemates, the biggest change so far has been the crate for glass. "Everyone in my house is used to having a bin that goes out on the street, so the crate has taken a little getting used to."

With these changes we're helping fix Australia's recycling industry, creating local jobs and using waste as a resource, instead of sending it to landfill. This is something Louis is happy to get behind. "We send far too much waste to landfill, so the more we can reduce or repurpose the better. I also think there's a really strong impetus right now to act on issues like waste ... and changing the way we recycle is a step in the right direction.

"I think it's a great initiative," says Louis. "I'd love to see it rolled out across [Yarra]."

This trial will last for about 12 months and then we will consider expanding the service throughout Yarra.

GIRLS ROCK!

Live music is usually out of bounds when you're not old enough to set foot in a bar. And even in 2019 gigs are often male dominated.

The Girls Rock! Melbourne Fundraiser is changing that, with more than 20 musical acts - none all male. And to top it off, all ages are welcome. It's all part of our annual Leaps and Bounds Music Festival.

Many of the performers volunteer with Girls Rock! to mentor and empower young female, trans and gender-diverse youth.

"Providing a platform for bands that are mostly fronted by women and gender non-conforming people has been really important", says sound engineer Ebony Rattle, who organised the fundraiser.

Girls Rock! is all about addressing gender inequality in the music industry, and nurturing young female and gender-diverse musicians through education and mentoring.

Along with Ebony, many of the performers volunteer with Girls Rock! to mentor and empower young female, trans and gender diverse youth.

"We usually only play at over-18 gigs, so our mentees don't really ever get a chance to actually see us do our thing," says solo artist Dominique.

"All-ages gigs are the perfect opportunity for people who want to grow up to be in the music industry to actually start getting in the scene at a younger age," says Ebony.

All profits from the show will go towards the Girls Rock! September camp.


