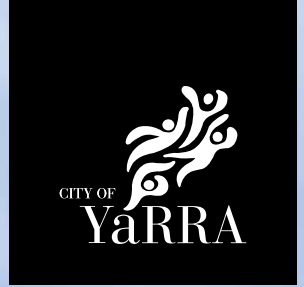

SMART BENCHES TO PROVIDE FREE WIFI, PHONE CHARGING TO COMMUNITY

People on the go will now be able to charge their device or connect to free Wi-Fi at one of three new smart benches.

These benches are the first of their kind in inner-city Melbourne, and are powered by 100% renewable solar energy.

Eco Renewable Energy (ERE), our partnering company, is providing and maintaining the benches at no cost to Yarra.

The Smart Benches will further enhance Yarra's public spaces, providing free Wi-Fi and phone charging to anyone who connects.

By providing these benches, we are offering all residents online access to critical information, products and services – particularly those who may not otherwise have access.

Built-in environmental sensors collect and share real-time data about temperature, humidity and air pressure. Users can see this information on a dashboard on ERE's website.

This information may be able to be used to inform important planning decisions, particularly any that relate to action against the climate emergency.

Each of Yarra's three wards will have a smart bench installed. The Smart Bench locations are:

- Nicholls Ward: Atherton Gardens oval, Napier Street, Fitzroy
- Langridge Ward: Curtain Square park, Carlton North
- Melba Ward: Stewart Street, Richmond, opposite Corner Hotel.

The benches will be offered on a pilot basis of around six months. After this, Yarra and ERE will look at usage data and determine the next steps.

A STEP CLOSER TO OUR COMMUNITY VISION

A community panel is meeting this May to create our first-ever Community Vision.

The vision will guide decision making about Yarra's services and projects for the next 15 years.

The panel will be provided with an overview of what we heard from around 1300 participants during our broad consultation between November 2020 and January 2021.

The panel strongly reflects our diverse community, with people from all walks of life who are set to share their life experiences and views with each other. They are meeting four times.

Yarra City Council has worked hard to develop a draft Budget that continues to invest in the local community and deliver key essential services, while also responding to the climate emergency.

Yarra's pools, gyms, and Council facilities will transition away from gas and towards being powered entirely by renewable electricity.

The draft Budget 2021–2022 also provides funding to plant 1300 new trees, install new bike hoops and new bike lanes across Yarra, as well as planning for a food and organic bin collection.

Despite the significant financial impact of the pandemic, Yarra Council has prepared a draft Budget that continues to build a fairer and more equal Yarra, that creates opportunities and tackles the climate emergency.

It remains committed to delivering key essential services to our community, optimising service delivery and customer experience and maximising use of existing assets.

This year's draft Budget was developed following broad community consultation held between November 2020 and January 2021. During this time, we heard from more than 1300 people about their aspirations and priorities for the future. These insights will help inform Yarra's 15-year Community Vision and the draft Budget 2021–22. See an update on our Community Vision on page 3.

The draft Budget has a strong focus on sustainability, both in terms of our fiscal responsibilities and the types of infrastructure we are delivering. It delivers on Yarra's key strategic priorities and ensures that Council has a stable financial position in the years ahead.

Yarra's financial position had been impacted significantly by COVID-19 and that had been an important consideration in the delivery of this year's draft Budget.

Like all councils, and all tiers of Government for that matter, the development of this year's draft Budget has presented many challenges due to the financial losses experienced as a direct result of the pandemic.

We invested heavily in the local community throughout the pandemic by providing a package of community and business support totalling more than \$7.5 million. Despite the deficit this created in 2020–21, we're pleased to be continuing our commitment to the community, through a budget that supports our most vulnerable residents, boosts our local businesses and addresses climate change.

This draft Budget responds to the extraordinary circumstances of last year, highlights the resilience we have all shown and acknowledges and strengthens community aspirations and strategic priorities for Yarra.

The draft Budget includes a rate increase of 1.5%, which is in line with the 2021–22 rate cap outlined under the Fair Go Rating System and will be accompanied by a 1.5% increase in our additional rate rebate for pensioners.

CELEBRATING THE WOMEN OF YARRA

EXCEPTIONAL WOMEN FROM THE CITY OF YARRA



HONOURING CULTURE, AND HELPING COMMUNITIES HEAL: SUE-ANNE HUNTER

"I'm a proud Wurundjeri woman, mum and advocate for the community. I hold a space for people to facilitate their own [cultural] healing.

Originally, during COVID-19, everyone was ok. When lockdown started to get longer, people reached out because they were struggling. My daughter Jedda and I created Connecting to Country meditations to help. We put them online with some strategies around keeping connected to mind, body and spirit.

I sort-of fell into this work and I love what I do. It's about serving the community and making things better for the next generation, honouring culture in every way possible."



WELCOMING ALL PEOPLE INTO OUR NEIGHBOURHOOD HOUSES: SUE KENT

"I work alongside, and with, local residents [as manager of the Belgium Avenue Neighbourhood House at the North Richmond Housing Estate, and Collingwood Neighbourhood House at the Collingwood Housing Estate]. It's such a diverse, generous community, so creative in its approaches to solving problems.

Over the years, art has really worked for this neighbourhood house and our culturally diverse community. It doesn't rely on language. It has its own language.

COVID-19 was like a roller coaster ... We found a way, through offering food security and food relief, to meet the needs of a very frightened, vulnerable community and keep them socially connected."



FOOTBALL AT AN ELITE LEVEL: ELLIE MCKENZIE

"I was about five when I started footy. I played with the boys' team when I was about 8 to 13 ... the only girl in the competition. Early on the boys would be a bit hesitant whether to tackle me or not.

When I got drafted [to Richmond FC] my first reaction was relief, just to know that I'd made it, and also excitement and a bit overwhelmed.

Kicking my first goal in AFL was amazing. Something I've been dreaming of. All of my teammates got around me too. It's definitely something I won't forget, ever."



SUPPORTING THE HOMELESS, ESSENTIAL WORKERS, AND THEIR PETS: SANDHYA JADU

Sandhya Jadu is a social worker at Melbourne City Mission, and helps people experiencing homelessness find safe and secure housing. In her spare time, she pet-sits.

“During the stage 4 lockdown, I realised people needed support to exercise their pets while balancing work, home schooling and navigating lockdown.

I started offering help to people in the community, walking their dogs and checking in with them. During [this time] I did this every day.

Freyja (pictured) belongs to an essential worker who works in the disability sector. Looking after Freyja was an opportunity to help her owner.”

INSPIRING GIRLS TO GET INTO SPORT: KATE MORTON AND CECELIA WARD

Kate and Cecelia run the Richmond Skippers netball club, which helps primary school girls in Yarra get involved in netball.

Kate: “It was Cecelia’s idea to start up a club for girls, that gets girls into sport.

Cecelia: We realised that there were heaps of girls in our community who weren’t getting the opportunity to play netball. It’s a bit about fitness but mainly about learning teamwork and making friends.

Kate: They’ve got a very positive attitude, they don’t care whether they win or lose too much.

Cecelia: With our first team, we were just thinking about them playing sport. Then we had an end of year get-together and some of the parents were quite teary. They said to us: ‘you’ve changed our daughter’s life – her schoolwork has improved and she’s connected at school. She’s got so much confidence.’”



MAKING SURE NO-ONE FALLS THROUGH THE CRACKS: RACHEL POWNING

Rachel is General Manager of the Neighbourhood Justice Centre.

“We were really concerned about the impact of COVID-19 on people living in Yarra.

We recognised the Neighbourhood Justice Centre could help to bring the agencies together across Yarra to try to minimise any negative impacts of COVID-19 for [public housing] communities.

It was a lot of logistical, emergency response management. Just making sure everyone knew what others were doing so no one fell through the cracks.

The biggest challenge was making sure our clients were okay, constantly thinking ‘what can we be doing to make this easier for the community?’.

I just want to keep doing work that changes people’s lives for the better. That changes society.”



WASTE AND RECYCLING IN YARRA: HOW ARE WE TRACKING?

To help improve the way we recycle, we rolled out a new waste and recycling system across Yarra in November 2020.

This included introducing a new purple-lidded glass-only recycling bin, and changing what can go in the yellow-lidded recycling bin.

Your yellow-lidded bin is now being collected fortnightly. This brings Yarra in line with 72 out of the 79 councils in Victoria that also collect recycling fortnightly. Recycling starts at home, and we all have an important role to play in addressing the recycling crisis. Overall our community has been doing a great job.

FAST FACTS

Since launching the new glass bin in November 2020:



Almost 923 tonnes of glass collected for recycling (about the same weight as 150 elephants!)



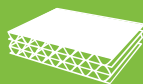
35.48 tonnes less waste from rubbish bins has gone to landfill, compared with this time last year



The average yellow-lidded recycling bin is around $\frac{3}{4}$ full when it's collected



Only 1 in 50 rubbish bins and 1 in 10 recycle bins are overflowing



Since its launch on 26 February 2021 our cardboard recycling drop off point in Burnley has already collected 150 cubic metres of cardboard to recycle



Most recycle bins that were overflowing were the smaller size (it's free to upgrade to the larger size – see more below)

MAKE THE MOST OF YOUR RECYCLING BIN

- **Flatten all cardboard boxes**
Unflattened cardboard is the most common cause of overflowing bins in Yarra, so make sure you remove the tape and flatten your boxes before putting them in your recycling bin.
- **Drop off any excess recycling**
This could include large one-off items such as the cardboard packaging for new home appliances. Find out more about our recycling drop off centres at yarracity.vic.gov.au/dropoff
- **Get a bigger recycling bin**
If you need more room for your recycling, we can swap it over to a larger bin free of charge. Visit our website to request a bin upgrade: yarracity.vic.gov.au/binupgrade



Both recycle bins pictured show the same amount of waste including the boxes piled next to the one on the left. Unflattened boxes are the main cause of overflows.

- **Scrunch your aluminium foil into a ball**
This will also help the people sorting it to separate it from other items.
- **Squash your plastic bottles and aluminium cans**
- **Minimise the packaging that you buy**
A great way to do this is to switch to reusable, refillable products.

WHICH BIN DOES THIS GO IN?

Is it your yellow-lidded recycling bin, purple-lidded glass bin or your general rubbish bin? Test your recycling knowledge and see if you know which bin these items go in.



MILK OR JUICE CARTONS

Answer: Rubbish bin

These are not accepted by Yarra's recycling processor because they have a plastic lining to keep the liquid in. This plastic cannot be easily separated from the cardboard, as so cannot be recycled by our processor.

Instead, look for milk or other liquids in plastic or glass bottles which are accepted in Yarra's recycling bins.



PLASTIC BAG

Answer: Rubbish bin

Soft, scrunchable plastics can't be placed in your recycling bin.

If they're clean and dry, you can recycle them by taking them to a REDcycle bin at participating supermarkets. Find out more at redcycle.net.au

It is also important that you do not wrap your other items in plastic bags when putting them in your recycling bins. Items in plastic bags can't be separated and so your recycling will end up in landfill.



BATTERIES

Answer: None of your household bins



The Victorian Government has banned electronic waste from going into landfill, so batteries cannot be placed in any of your household bins.

You must take electronic waste including batteries to a drop off point, such as at our Customer Service Centres or Clifton Hill Depot. You can find an electronic waste drop off near you on our zero waste map: yarracity.vic.gov.au/zerowaste



BROKEN WINE GLASS

Answer: Rubbish bin

Only glass jars and bottles go in your purple-lidded glass bin. Other types of glass such as drinking glasses or vases have different melting points, and so cannot be included with your glass recycling.



METAL JAR LIDS

Answer: Recycling bin

While your glass bottles and jars go in your purple-lidded bin, metal lids need to be separated into your yellow-lidded recycling bin.

Plastic lids, however, go in your rubbish bin.



BERRY PUNNETS

Answer: Rubbish

Unfortunately this plastic punnet is not labelled 5. Most punnets are labelled 1, but as it is not a bottle, our recycling processor will not accept it.

Punnets are made from a variety of different plastics, and the processor is not able to tell quickly which type it is. Also this type of "flimsy" plastic does not make for a high quality product.

SMALL BUSINESS AMBASSADORS WORKING ONE-ON-ONE WITH LOCAL TRADERS

Five new Small Business Ambassadors are working closely with traders to provide practical, on-the-ground support and help meet the ongoing challenges local business face as a result of COVID-19.

Yarra's Small Business Ambassadors, funded by the Victorian Government, are working one-on-one with local business to connect them with much-needed peer support, mentoring and training, as well as provide the latest information and advice on COVID-19 guidelines and restrictions, grants and government support.

This builds on the significant support Yarra has provided local businesses over the past 12 months including direct grants, permit fee waivers and refunds.

GIVING BACK TO COMMUNITY: \$1.8 MILLION IN COMMUNITY GRANTS

Yarra Council has awarded over \$1.8 million in community grants to more than 150 incredible applicants through the latest round of its Annual Grants and Investing in Community Grants 2021–23.

This funding supports initiatives in the arts, culture, events, community development, climate action, community housing, family support, youth services, sports and recreation.

Yarra's Annual Grants and Investing in Community Grants programs are awarded to not-for-profit organisations and community members throughout the City of Yarra to support innovative ideas and projects.

Under Yarra's Annual Grants 2021, we're providing more than \$900,000 to 143 applicants. A further 11 applicants will share in more than \$900,000 over three years through the Investing in Community Grants.

Successful projects funded through this year's Annual Grants and Investing in Community Grants 2021–23 include:

- Disability Day Radio from the Community Radio Federation: 12 hours of dynamic radio featuring the voices, ideas and creative talents of people with disabilities in Yarra.
- Youth Behind the Wheel from the Young Assets Foundation – driver safety education to culturally and linguistically diverse young people.
- Let's Keep Cooking from Cultivating Community – find out more on page 13.

PRECINCT RECOVERY GRANTS SUPPORTING BUSINESSES

To help revitalise Yarra, more than \$160,000 in grant funding has been awarded to support 10 exciting projects, including:

- Victoria Street Online Marketplace
- Smith Street Vintage Trail
- Burnley Street beautification, including plant and art boxes
- "Your Hood with the Goods" North Fitzroy Village campaign

This is the second round of our Precinct Recovery Grants, with a total of 19 projects supported with \$320,000 in Precinct Recovery Grant funding to date.

MAPPING COMMUNITY SAFETY ACROSS VICTORIA



We want to make sure people of all genders feel safe in Yarra.

To help give us some insight, we're working with Monash University's gender, design and space specialists, XYX Lab, and award-winning digital consultancy, CrowdSpot, to gather perceptions of safety in public space and make real change in our local area.

The project, called **YourGround**, looks at women's and gender diverse people's perceived recreational safety at different locations across Victoria, including Yarra.

For the next few months, YourGround's online interactive map will be open for community submissions.

Everyone is encouraged to contribute. We're interested to know how locations make you feel, and how different factors make you feel more or less safe.

YARRA AWARDED GRANT FOR ROAD MADE FROM RECYCLED TYRES, THAT WATER TREES AND REDUCES POLLUTION

A street in Yarra is set to be paved with recycled tyres, with a new technology that reduces waste, encourages tree growth, and prevents pollution.

This high infiltration permeable pavement – which will be used to construct a centre median in Mcllwraith Street, Princes Hill – retains moisture, preventing pollutants from entering our drainage network and reducing stormwater runoff.

The water it retains can then be used by the surrounding trees and plants, encouraging more growth to prevent the heat island effect.

The pavement is made from around 70% recycled tyres, sourced from a Victorian facility – diverting this waste from landfill – as well as recycled glass and rock particles to give it the strength needed to sustain the weight of cars and other vehicles.

Yarra has been awarded a \$90,000 grant from the Victorian Government through Sustainability Victoria's Sustainable Infrastructure Fund to support this project. Yarra Council is contributing an additional \$75,000, and is partnering with the University of Melbourne to deliver this innovative water sensitive urban design project.



Over the next two years, Yarra Council and the University of Melbourne will monitor how the permeable pavers perform mechanically, and how surrounding tree health is affected.

We're one of 18 Victorian councils and alpine resort management boards to be supported to use recycled materials in infrastructure projects, through this Victorian Government initiative.

Collectively, the projects will use approximately 2,000 tonnes of recycled materials including glass, plastic and rubber to create roads, footpaths, outdoor park furniture, drainage and pavements.

The Sustainable Infrastructure Fund is part of the Victorian Government's ground-breaking \$380 million Recycling Victoria: A new economy plan that is transforming Victoria's waste and recycling sector and building its circular economy.

FROM PLOUGH TO PLATE: CULTIVATING COMMUNITY HELPS PEOPLE GROW, COOK AND EAT SUSTAINABLY

For more than 20 years, Cultivating Community has been challenging Yarra residents to take a closer look at their food.

As our population grows, so too will the demand for more food. Cultivating Community works side by side with public housing and diverse communities, and educates people on sustainable and culturally appropriate food practices.

“We love food and we love people. We use food – the growing, preparation and eating of it – to connect people and bring joy.”

Through a range of hands-on workshops, participants learn about where our food comes from, how to grow it, and how to make delicious, diverse and sustainable meals at home.

Cultivating Community also focuses on supporting those at risk of food insecurity, offering these people food pantry program and a safe, dignified environment to bond over culturally diverse dishes.

“You may see a session producing a tuna nicoise salad, or perhaps injera or sourdough crumpets, [or] chocolate muffins, romesco, fajitas and coconut macaroons,” said Rob Rees, Cultivating Community CEO.

Cultivating Community plans to bring all its cooking-based programs together, under a new, larger, broader program called Let’s Keep Cooking. Yarra is supporting Let’s Keep Cooking with an Investing in Community Grant.

“If you are part of Let’s Keep Cooking activities you will see our experts encouraging people to get involved with tasting, touching, preparation and of course, the enjoyment of eating together”

“This funding will allow us to think more long-term about how we run more cooking clubs and develop food-based opportunities for all throughout the City of Yarra.”

Cultivating Community has community gardens at each of Yarra’s three public housing high rises, as well as a community baking group in Fitzroy and other healthy food initiatives that support people in and around Yarra who need it.

HELPING THE COMMUNITY HELP THE ENVIRONMENT

Yarra is supporting sustainable community-led programs through our Investing in Community Grants, which prioritise programs that help the community respond to the climate emergency.

This is also the first year we had a Climate Action stream as part of our Annual Grants.

EXERCISE FOR ALL ABILITIES

Dee has been attending the Cerebral Palsy Program at Richmond Recreation Centre for 10 years. Every Wednesday, she makes the journey from her home in Craigieburn to Richmond where she works out with gym instructors Xavier and Andrew.

When she first started the program, Dee found it a little daunting, but being part of it has empowered her and has encouraged her to prioritise her fitness.

“I do it because it gets me moving, it really helps with my mobility and strength” she says.

Yarra Leisure’s Cerebral Palsy Program is the only one like it in Melbourne. It’s run by passionate and knowledgeable gym instructors who support and guide a small group of participants and their carers through strength building exercises.

The Cerebral Palsy Program isn’t just an opportunity to work out, it’s a place where people can connect and meet others with shared lived experiences.

Only plastic bottles labelled 1 and 2 (lids off), and plastic food packaging labelled 5, can go in your yellow-lidded recycling bin.



Collection

We are still doing weekly recycling collections, alternating between glass and other recyclables.
