

Like all councils in Victoria, we are facing financial challenges with rising cost pressures, rate capping and cost shifting, coupled with unprecedented growth, and increasing pressure and demand on our services.

We are deeply committed to serving the best interests of our community and recognise that consistent effort will be required to maintain financial sustainability and most effectively use public funds.

That means we are making smart and responsible decisions now, that will have far-reaching results into the future.

Our draft Budget 2023/24 is currently open for feedback. We have worked hard to align the Budget with Yarra's Council Plan 2021–25 and Community Vision, while addressing financial challenges and prioritising financial sustainability.

The Victorian Government has introduced important legislation to reduce waste, increase recycling and create a circular economy.

Deducting the waste charge from general rates and charging it as a separate line item means we can be more transparent, responsible, and equitable in the way we charge for waste services and recover the true cost.

Local artist announced for Archie Roach AM AC and Ruby Hunter statue

Fitzroy-based artist Darien Pullen has been selected to design the sculpture that will honour the late Uncle Archie Roach AM AC and Aunty Ruby Hunter.

The creation of the statue is supported by the Victorian Government to celebrate and honour Uncle Archie and Aunty Ruby, their legacy and impact on the Australian music industry and their contributions to cultural life and the First Nations community.

Pullen was appointed following a competitive EOI process and in consultation with Uncle Archie and Aunty Ruby's families, the Wurunderji Woi-wurrung Cultural Heritage Aboriginal Corporation and Yarra Council.

Pullen, who works primarily in bronze sculptures, most recently created the sculpture of Australian music icon Michael Gudinski which is located outside Rod Laver Arena.

Yarra's draft Budget for 2023/24

Our draft annual Budget will go out for public exhibition on Friday 21 April.

Yarra City Council prides itself on the quality, accessibility, and diversity of services we provide to the community. In addition to the services most councils provide, Yarra ensures our community has access to affordable childcare, aged care and disability services including home care, and a broad range of fitness and leisure facilities and programs.

So that Yarra can continue to provide our community with quality services and infrastructure now and in the future, we need to make some smart decisions now that will have tangible benefits in the years to come.

We have worked hard to prepare a draft Budget that aligns with Yarra's Council Plan 2021–25 and Community Vision, while addressing ongoing financial challenges and prioritising financial sustainability. In addition to prioritising essential services and efficient infrastructure, we have carefully chosen to fund some key innovative projects that align with our Community Vision across all priority areas.

Our community's priorities are: climate and the environment, social equity and health, local economy, place and nature, transport and movement, and democracy and governance.

Changes to rates – Separating waste service charges

Victoria is moving towards a circular economy – a society that views waste as a valuable resource.

Yarra is very supportive of this change, but it does mean the cost of managing waste and recycling in Victoria is rising significantly. This is creating major challenges for all local councils and the recycling industry.

To meet the rising cost of waste transport and processing, and ensure Yarra's financial sustainability into the future, Council will be separating the cost of providing waste services from general rates.

This means the cost of providing waste services will no longer be included in general rates and will be listed as a separate charge. Being clear on how much waste costs allows us to continue to provide essential waste and recycling services, as well as the full range of




services our community values and relies on, like libraries and childcare.

The funds collected from a separate waste service charge will only be used to cover the costs of providing waste and recycling services in Yarra.

Yarra is the last Victorian council to make the decision to separate waste service charges from general rates.

We also want to reassure our community that Council is not currently considering any changes to our kerbside collection schedule.





Why does Yarra need a separate waste service charge?

The cost of providing waste services is increasing beyond what Victorian councils can recover through rates alone.

The rate cap, introduced by the Victorian Government, has capped the amount that councils can charge property owners in their Annual Rates Notices. The rate cap has averaged 1.75% over the past three years and will be 3.5% for 2023/24.

The cost of the Victorian Government waste levy (a levy paid to the Victorian Government by every council based on the amount of waste sent to landfill) has increased by 90% over the past three years.

The Victorian Government has also introduced laws to reduce waste, make the most of material that can be reused or repaired, and increase recycling. It includes a requirement for all councils to provide households with a four-stream waste



service (glass, recycling, food and green organics, and rubbish). In Yarra, we introduced a glass bin service in 2020.

To deliver the state-wide changes required by the Victorian Government while still providing all the services our community relies on, we need to take steps to recover the increasing costs of providing waste services.

By charging for the cost of waste services separately, the Victorian Government's rate cap will no longer apply. This allows Council to recover the true cost of providing waste services to our community.

We know that the Yarra community is committed to sustainability and supports innovation in waste minimisation and recycling. A separate waste service charge will allow us to meet the new legal requirements that enforce sustainable, responsible and innovative waste reduction and recycling solutions.

It will also mean that the rising cost of waste does not negatively impact our ability to provide other vital community services like libraries, leisure centres, sporting facilities and support for vulnerable members of our community.


The rising cost of waste affects every council in Victoria. The cost is not determined by Council and is outside of Council's control. We are addressing this issue now – in a transparent and financially responsible manner – to ensure that we can continue to provide the full range of services to our community now, and for future generations.

Financial sustainability

Council is committed to serving the best interests of the community and recognises that consistent effort will be required to ensure that we remain financially sustainable and make the most effective use of public funds. One of Council's key responsibilities is to ensure it is financially sustainable for both current and future communities.

Like all Victorian councils, we are facing financial challenges with rising cost pressures, rate capping and cost shifting, coupled with unprecedented growth and increasing pressure and demand on our services. Work to meet these challenges will need to be ongoing and require constant attention. There is no single solution – rather a holistic approach will be required – of which a waste charge is just one component.

The preparation of a long-term Financial Sustainability Strategy is underway, which aims to provide Council with guidance for the longterm sustainable management of its

resources. These strategic reforms seek to ensure that Council's future investment decisions are based on need, underpinned by evidence and guided by informed strategies including detailed asset management plans, contemporary property management and community infrastructure planning and an ongoing program of service reviews. Council has already made progress on reducing expenditure, reducing senior management roles and other efficiencies.

The rising cost of providing waste services is a known risk and separating the waste charge from general rates is critical to addressing this risk to ensure Council's financial sustainability is not eroded further.

The waste service charge in action

On your Annual Rates Notice, you are currently charged a single 'general rate' based on your property value. Currently, a component of your general rates pays for waste services.

With a separate waste service charge, the cost of providing waste services will be removed from general rates and listed as a separate line item on your Annual Rates Notice.



While the rate cap will not apply to the waste service charge, the money collected through the waste service charge can only be used to cover the costs of providing waste and recycling services in Yarra.

There are currently almost 18,000 properties in Yarra that are paying for a kerbside collection service they do not receive. Separating the cost of providing waste services from general rates will allow us to rectify this.





What's in the waste service charge and how is it applied?


The waste service charge will be made up of two elements: a public waste rate and a kerbside waste rate.

The **public waste rate** covers all waste and cleaning services that benefit the whole community. This includes, but is not limited to: street sweeping, street and park bin collection and litter removal.

The **kerbside waste rate** covers the cost of the regular household recycling, glass and rubbish bin collection service, operating the recycling centre, booked hard rubbish and green waste collection and processing; as well as providing new and replacement bins, transport, fuel, waste contracts, the cost of processing recyclables and the cost of disposing of materials. This charge also covers the cost of the Victorian Government's waste levy, a levy which all councils must pay based on how much material is sent to landfill.

The term 'rate' in this instance means that the cost to each property will be scaled based on property value. This is the same way we calculate general rates. Individuals with higher value properties pay more when compared to individuals with lower value properties.

The kerbside waste rate will only be applied to properties



When waste service charges are separated from general rates, your rates notice will show the following charges:

- General rates
- Public waste service rate
- Kerbside waste service rate (if you receive a Council waste collection service)

When you look at your Annual Rates Notice, you will be able to clearly identify the cost of your yearly waste services.



Considering individual circumstances

The waste service charge will look different for each ratepayer depending on a number of factors including property value, pension status and if you receive a kerbside service from Council. You can find a range of different personas we've created on our website to demonstrate how the waste service charge can be applied to a range of different circumstances. Head over to our Your Say Yarra webpage to explore how a waste service charge might be applied to a situation similar to yours.

As always, we are happy to work with ratepayers to support those who are experiencing financial hardship. If you feel that you are unable to pay, you can request financial hardship support.

Our financial hardship policy aims to provide ratepayers and service users with a clear and transparent understanding of options and assistance available if currently experiencing financial difficulties.

We will continue to support pensioners with a council rates rebate, in addition to the pensioner rebate provided by the Victorian Government.

Opportunities to learn more

We understand that the waste service charge and rates in general are complicated topics, so we're dedicated to ensuring our community has plenty of opportunities to learn more.

We're holding a range of 'Waste Station' events for community to learn more about the waste service charge, Yarra's waste and recycling services, and our contribution to Victoria's circular economy.

Rock-a-bye baby



We're supporting local families with our Sleep and Settling program, which helps to find the right strategies to meet the sleep needs of their young children.

Babies need sleep to grow and develop well, but their sleep needs vary.

To support parents and caregivers, Yarra provides specialist information sessions on sleep and settling for newborns, babies and toddlers.

These sessions are designed to provide information and guidance at identified developmental stages on typical sleep patterns and behaviours that are commonly seen in children.



The aim is to support confidence in responding to infant sleep needs and give strategies and advice on addressing sleep and settling concerns using safe and effective evidence-based techniques.

Identified areas of interest include:

- Understanding sleep and sleep cycles
- Identifying children's cues
- Sleep associations
- Sleep concerns and management
- Safe sleeping

We also offer sessions for families with languages other than English, young mums, dads, grandparents and other carers.

Anyone who needs a healthy meal or a pantry restock is welcome to drop by and grab what they need – no questions asked.

"It's meant to offer a dignified experience," says Dylan Oosterweghel, Community Engagement and Outreach Officer. "People don't have any concerns or shame. You can generally tell who may be looking for food and the staff at the desk offer to open it up for them."



Addressing food insecurity issues through initiatives like the Community Pantry is part of our work to improve social equity and the health of our community.
