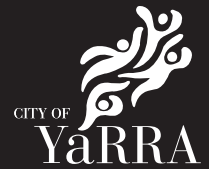

KICKING GOALS THANKS TO ANNUAL GRANTS

Some of Yarra's most vulnerable community members are turning their lives around through the Collingwood Knights' More Than Footy program, which has been able to thrive thanks to Council's Annual Grants Program.

The Club received funding through the 2016 Grants, and provides a safe haven and positive community environment for men and women ages 15 and up, who aren't working and who are struggling with challenges in their lives.

The two Knights teams play mid-week in the ReLink league, but it's more than just footy for the participants – the project is a holistic approach to wellbeing for identified community needs. Players are provided with free counselling, health services and education, as well as meals on training and game days.

"We wouldn't be able to do most of what we do if we didn't receive grants

like the one we did from Council," admits Chris McGeachan, a full-time police officer at Fitzroy and is also the club's Team Manager.

"The Club provides a positive hangout spot for these people, some of whom are struggling with addiction or who have gotten on the wrong side of the law.

“ We offer an opportunity for people to participate and to be a part of something positive, and that is really important. ”

This is a sentiment echoed by 22-year-old Cody Miles who has been part of the Knights for the past five years.

"This is a place for people to feel like they belong. It is just the best feeling to be here," he said.

There is no registration fee, cost or expected contribution to be part of the team who play and train on alternate weeks on Wednesdays at Victoria Park.

Council has worked hard to renovate and restore Victoria Park and its facilities. This investment allows community members and organisations like the Knights, the opportunity to exist and utilise the space.

Applications for Council's 2017 Annual Grants Program open on Monday 13 June and close at 5pm on Monday 25 July 2016.

Community groups and individuals providing programs that address local needs and enhance the health and wellbeing of the Yarra community are encouraged to apply.

COUNCIL CELEBRATES REFUGEE WEEK

High-profile human rights and refugee advocate Julian Burnside AO QC, will be returning to Yarra later this month to inspire the audience at Council's annual Refugee Week event.

We had a quick chat with the passionate Australian barrister ahead of his anticipated appearance.

Q: *Yarra was one of the first Refugee Welcome Zones (back in 2002) making the commitment to welcome refugees into the community. Generally speaking, how do you see Yarra in this space?*

A: It's fantastic that Yarra is taking such a forward-looking, enlightened and decent position. There are other Councils that are doing similarly [but it is] creditable that they are taking the position they have.

Q: *Refugees and asylum seekers face many challenges during settlement and beyond. How can people support these people and help them feel connected in their new community?*

A: Act as if it's your brother or sister you haven't seen in a long time, just treat them the way you'd like to be treated. [Also] Council could organise simple, regular dinners... It's very hard to misunderstand people once you've shared a meal with someone.

Q: *As part of Yarra's Refugee Week Event, you will be joined by two other panelists. Are you able to give us a sneak peek into what you might be sharing at the Thursday 23 June event?*

A: [Laughs] It's too early to tell!

RATES NOTICES ON THE WAY

Yarra property owners are reminded to be on the lookout for their 2016/17 rates notice, which is expected to be delivered to households in mid-August.

Rates help fund essential services like waste and recycling collection, road infrastructure and a range of community initiatives that improve the health and wellbeing of our community. They also allow us to maintain and improve our libraries, expand our parks, support local business and encourage participation in junior sport.

Your rates notice for the 2016/17 financial year will take into account the State Government's 2.5 per cent cap on rates, as well as the most recent revaluation of your property. Council has elected not to apply for an exemption to the mandatory cap.

It is important to remember that the 2.5 per cent cap does not apply to your individual bill, but rather to the total amount of money that Council is seeking from rates revenue.

Your property has recently been reassessed as part of a regular state-wide revaluation.

As your council rates are linked to property values in your area you may see changes on your rates notice. Almost all properties in Yarra will experience rates changes that are higher or lower than 2.5 per cent. See below for an example.

LOCAL GROUP'S RISE TO THE TOP

Together Like Brothers (TLB) is set to be one of the breakout acts at this year's Leaps and Bounds Festival, and it's been a wild ride to centre stage for the young Yarra band.

Ror, Dut, Gum and Adim have honed their craft over the past four years as part of the Rising High Music Program, run by Council's Yarra Youth Services. What initially began as a hobby has put them on the path to stardom, with the band releasing their first ever album at this year's Festival.

"It's our first time being part of Leaps and Bounds and we are so excited by the build-up and we are really looking forward to performing," says 19-year-old Ror.

"This is our first album as a group and our tracks touch on quite a lot of topics, but essentially the album is about striving for what you want in life. We are trying to be role models for other young people and trying to be role models through our music."

Raised in South Sudan and inspired by the likes of Tupac and Bob Marley, TLB pride themselves on their story-telling. Their songs are about positive social

issues and messages about assimilation, racism and adapting to a new culture.

The hip hop collective all live in the Collingwood and Fitzroy housing estates, and wrote and recorded all 14 songs on their debut album at the local community studio.

"The program is really where we started," says Ror of Rising High which assists young Yarra residents to find a professional pathway into the music

business. "Being around industry professionals really helped us understand who we were and what genre we wanted to pursue"

"We are so excited that we are now here as part of Leaps and Bounds to perform songs from our album at the launch at the Evelyn Hotel."

TLB's album launch will be at the Evelyn Hotel, 351 Brunswick Street on Saturday 2 July.

RENEWAL FOR FITZROY GASWORKS

Places Victoria, the State Government's property development agency, has announced it is investigating the potential renewal of the Fitzroy Gasworks site, located at 433 Smith Street, Fitzroy.

The 3.9 hectare former industrial site, which is owned by the State Government, has the potential to be developed into a diverse precinct –

providing a variety of new homes, shops, cafes and other community facilities.

Places Victoria sought community input to help inform a design concept and to contribute to a future masterplan for the site from May to early June.

Following this initial phase of community engagement and further due diligence,

Places Victoria will decide if it is feasible to move forward with the proposal.

REVAMP FOR RICHMOND LIBRARY

A change is in the air at Richmond Library, with the facility set to undergo a substantial refurbishment in late June.

The 415 Church Street premises will be closed from Friday 24 June to Monday 11 July while the comprehensive restoration takes place. New furniture, carpet, shelving and other cosmetic alterations will form the bulk of the renovations.

The works are thanks to funding received by Council as part of the State Government's 2015 Living

Libraries Infrastructure Program.

As a result of these works, Yarra Libraries customers can expect improved levels of service and increased opportunity to participate in a range of programs and services not currently provided at the Richmond Library. These include IT training, pop-up maker space activities, talks, cultural events, art installations and exhibitions.

The new-look Richmond Library will be unveiled in the August/September edition of *Yarra News*.

HAVE YOUR SAY ON EXTENDED LIBRARY HOURS

A Yarra Council service already rated as excellent and ranked third on customer satisfaction last year by residents is about to become even better.

Council is proposing to extend the opening hours for Yarra libraries by the end of this year, to coincide with the opening of the North Fitzroy Community Hub. Residents are invited to vote and comment on these proposed changes. These include all libraries opening from 10am Monday to Saturday and more libraries staying open until 8pm from Monday to Thursday.

The proposal involves two options with up to an additional 35 extra library opening hours a week overall across Yarra, at no extra cost to Council. The proposed changes result in a reduction in library hours in some areas.

NDIS COMES TO YARRA

From 1 July 2016, the City of Yarra will be one of the first Local Government Areas to be part of the National Disability Insurance Scheme (NDIS) national roll-out.

Under the NDIS, people with disability will have control over how, when and where their funding is spent. Yarra is one of five Councils in the North East Metropolitan Area in which the NDIS will roll-out from 1 July, and Council is currently considering the role it will play under this scheme.

A report went to Council on 17 May presenting four options – Council being a full service provider, a limited service

provider, a temporary/transitional service provider, and not taking up this role at all.

It is estimated that 730 people in Yarra will be eligible for the NDIS. Of those, it is estimated that approximately 90-120 are current HACC (Home and Community Care) service users, who may be eligible for the NDIS.

Council will make a final decision on its role as a registered service provider under the NDIS at the 7 June meeting. More information on the outcome of this decision will be in the next edition of *Yarra News*.

A FIRST FOR COMMUNITY CAR ACCESSIBILITY

In a first for the municipality and Victoria, Yarra now has an accessible vehicle available for hire through a community-focused car share scheme, Car Next Door.

Council's Disability Advisory Committee (DAC) has been advocating for more than a decade for a car accessible to a passenger in a wheelchair to be available in a commercial car fleet.

After approaching a number of organisations and exploring a multitude of options over the years, DAC member Martin Leckey recently purchased a modified Kia Carnival. The car is able to accommodate a driver and four passengers, including one passenger in a wheelchair. The car has been available for hire through Car Next Door since April.

"We [the DAC] had been looking at ways to get an accessible car that people could share for quite some time without success," said Martin. "I then heard about Car Next Door and thought if I bought a vehicle I could share it through the scheme – I hadn't bought a car before now."

The lack of an accessible vehicle has previously excluded people who face challenges with accessibility, driving or using public transport from using a car pool system in Yarra.

In addition, limited availability and expensive costs of multi-purpose vehicles prevented many who rely on taxis and commercial hire car companies from getting out and about.

It's free to be a Car Next Door member and the accessible Kia can be rented for \$10/hr or for \$45 a day, with a rate of 33 c/km – cheaper than many other options, and one that provides much more freedom, says Martin.

"To have an accessible car available like this is particularly good for day trips or longer, and ideal for someone who may

want to try out an accessible vehicle before they bought one themselves," he says.

BUILDING MAINTENANCE LOOKS TO THE SKIES

Council is continuing to embrace technology, with the Building Maintenance team recently inspecting the Collingwood Library roof with the aid of a drone.

Roof inspections can be difficult and are often impossible without scaffolding, as was the case with the heritage-listed Collingwood Library.

In a first for Council, Building Maintenance was able to inspect the precarious site to assess its condition and determine plans for future works and budget spend – all from the ground.

The targeted inspection was three months in the planning and was undertaken in a strictly controlled

environment under the expertise of a specialist operator.

Council is always looking for innovative ways to undertake its services, and given this project's success, is considering using a drone annually to determine the best time to intervene and begin repairs on the library roof.

UPDATES TO GARBAGE BIN COLLECTION

New garbage collection times will commence from 1 July 2016.

Yarra Council has appointed a new contractor who has advised that while the days of garbage collection will not alter, the previous collection times will change.

Residents are reminded to place their garbage bin out the night before collection day.

BIG YEAR FOR L2P PROGRAM

In the past year, more than 20 young people, many from disadvantaged backgrounds have obtained their driver licence through the Yarra L2P Program, setting them on the road to new opportunities, jobs and social connections.

Council took over the innovative program last July and with the help of volunteer mentors, the program assists young people in achieving the 120 hours supervised practice hours needed for them to sit their driving test.

Many program participants do not have access to a family car, or don't have a parent or relative with a licence to help get their driving hours up.

Therefore, participants rely on the community program and its dedicated volunteers to obtain their P plates.

"I've been a mentor for about four years and I've loved it," said Jacquelyn Willox, who became involved after teaching her three children to drive.

“ Being a mentor allows me to interact with young people in different cultures, and keeps me in touch with their ideas, problems and ambitions of a different generation. ”

Two L2P cars are used for driving practice and all costs including petrol and insurance are covered by the

program, which is funded by the TAC and VicRoads. Participants have six professional driving lessons before they are matched with their mentor. Training is provided but mentors must hold a full Victorian driver licence and be willing to undergo a police check and a working with children check.
