

MESSAGE FROM THE MAYOR



As I approach the end of my mayoral term, I am reflecting on some of the big things we have achieved this year.

Our waste revolution trial in Abbotsford is offering us a glimpse of a better, more sustainable approach to waste.

We have abolished overdue fees at our five public libraries. Our libraries are at the heart of community life, and we don't want a fear of fines holding anyone back, especially those facing disadvantage.

We have supported our local Aboriginal community with a powerful Sorry Day event at the Stolen Generations Marker in Fitzroy.

We are building more bike lanes and boosting our tree planting budget (up by 20% in 2019/20).

We are increasing street cleansing in North Richmond in support of the supervised injecting facility trial.

And we have delivered on these new initiatives while continuing to deliver the basics of local government at an exceptionally high level.

I firmly believe that there is no substitute for going out into the community and listening to people's concerns first hand.

That's why I am so thankful to the hundreds of community members that have taken the time to share their stories with me over the past 11 months. I have particularly enjoyed hearing from some of Yarra's youngest citizens recently to chat about what improvements they want to see in their neighbourhoods.

We now embark on another of our most important conversations with the community: the next council budget for 2020/21. Make sure your voice is heard by coming along to one of our pop-up sessions in November. I hope to see you there!

The people who can least afford to pay late fees are often the ones who need library services the most. We believe that abolishing fines will encourage everyone to borrow more items and get more involved in library life.

Saint Bartholomew's 300 Burnley Street, Richmond

Sandy Power from St Bart's Opportunity Shops says that buying from the op shop isn't just good for the planet, it's good for the community too. "Nearly all the proceeds from this op shop go to our local community right here in Burnley. We help the food centre and domestic violence and refugee organisations." The store is jam packed with quirky finds and designer items. "We get Gucci and Prada in here quite often," says Sandy, "but at the moment our prize possession is a Furby."



Sacred Heart Mission 433 Brunswick Street, Fitzroy

If you thought op shops were daggy, Damian Brady from Sacred Heart Mission begs to differ. "If you come in here on a Saturday we're probably pumping ACDC! We have lots of young people working here too." What kind of cool stuff do they have in store at the moment? "These Gucci loafers, oh and a heap of wedding dresses," Damian says, noting that sales "help fund our women's shelter, aged care service, crisis accommodation and other programs."

Vinnies 121 Johnston Street, Collingwood

At Vinnies in Collingwood, Miranda Christie points out some of the more unusual treasures to be found, including an antique gas mask, original paintings and a mixture of toys from the 90s, including another Furby!

RIDING WELL ON WELLINGTON

The protected bike lanes on Wellington Street in Collingwood now run from Johnston Street to Victoria Parade in both directions.

Raised concrete islands and kerbs now fully separate people on bikes from parked cars and traffic, making their ride safer, comfortable and more enjoyable. "It's really great that all these people are getting to work on a bike, and they've got somewhere a bit safer to do so," says local resident and keen cyclist Troy Parsons.

Troy and his family don't own cars and get about our community on foot or bike. "I'm hoping that Wellington Street and other streets like that become a bit more reclaimed for people who want to walk and ride, and for shopping," he says.

Cycling is not only fun, healthy and sustainable, but it also reduces air pollution and traffic congestion, meaning all road users benefit.

The protected bike lanes are part of our vision to make Yarra more connected, sustainable and safe for everyone.

WASTE WONDERS

After just four months, our waste and recycling trial in Abbotsford has seen a 71% increase in waste being composted and recycled.

Back in June about 1,300 Abbotsford households joined the Yarra Waste Revolution, sorting their food and green waste, glass, recycling and rubbish into four separate bins.

Food and green waste is now being composted and the glass is being turned into new glass bottles. Low-quality glass will be used for road resurfacing across Yarra.

The separate glass collection is also boosting the quality of the other recycling we collect, which can be contaminated by glass fragments when it's all collected together.

The paper, cardboard, plastic and cans collected as part of the trial are all being processed in Australia, with most of it being turned into new products here in Victoria.



THE MAKEUP OF A BUSINESS

Johna Angok loves make-up. She's good at it, too. But South Sudanese-born Johna has always felt frustrated by the lack of nude colour options for people with dark skin.

"There's such a big variety of nudes for fairer skinned people, but for us, if we want to find a nude it would just be a brown. One brown. That's it."

Rather than be defeated, the 22-year-old saw an opportunity to do something she'd always wanted: start her own business.

That was last October. By May this year, she'd launched her inclusive Tinted Cosmetics label, starting with five lip glosses in varying shades of nude for people with dark skin. She formulates



the products herself using 100% locally-sourced, organic, cruelty-free ingredients.

Johna built her business with help from the Young Entrepreneurs in the North program: a nine-week course from Yarra and Moreland councils that gives budding innovators the skills they need to start their own business or social enterprise. "For me, the biggest thing I learned was marketing and how to put myself out there," says Johna, who dreams of seeing her make-up on supermarket shelves one day.

"I want to make makeup readily available for *all* skin types and shades."

LGBTI ELDERS SHARE AND CARE

The Collingwood-based Bent Twig Alliance is a special group. So special in fact, that two of its members make a five-hour round trip from Moe to be a part of it, and another person comes from Morwell. The group brings LGBTI elders together to talk about issues unique to their lived experience and to give something back to their communities.

Bent Twig member Terena Barnes says, "I've worked so hard as an adult with a family to look after, but now that I'm retired I'm really looking forward to getting involved in different political activities that will help the LGBTI community. I've never really had an opportunity to contribute to that."

Fellow member Jaimie Bloom sees it as a way to continue flying the flag for LGBTI rights. "No one else is going to do it for you," she says. And she's having a great time too. "Through this group I got onto two LGBTI dance classes and I am just absolutely addicted – it's so much fun, so social. I'm learning to dance and I'm meeting people!"

The group meets fortnightly at the Collingwood Seniors Hub. If meaningful conversation, delicious tea and cake, and the occasional tune on the piano sound like a good time, why not get involved?

MAKING SCIENCE PLAYFUL

Primary school kids gently jostle each other as they run up and down the school playground.

"I'm number one!" "No, me! I'm fastest!"

After burning off some energy, they huddle together to look at how fast they were going.

This is Yarra Science Play. It is more than a fun after-school activity. It empowers young people by giving them the tools they need to thrive in our increasingly technology-driven city.

At Richmond West Primary, parent volunteer Bruce Maton leads Yarra Science Play, a program developed by Yarra Council.

"Kids are using computers every day, so anything that helps kids understand the tech world around them will set them up for the digital future," Bruce says.

The children work with hand-held devices that sense speed, direction, and even temperature and brightness.

Bruce pulls out his laptop and points to a curve showing each kids' acceleration. They are transfixed, and squeal with excitement when they see their own data showing them get faster. Eight-year-old Chloe says she loves learning about how fast she can go, and also what the temperature is outside.

"Temperature is quite new to me so I loved learning about it while I get to run around. I love science – it's fun!"

MELBOURNE'S FIRST MOSQUE TURNS 50

The Albanian Australian Islamic Society (AAIS) are celebrating the 50th Anniversary of their mosque in Drummond Street, Carlton North.

It was the first mosque in Melbourne when it opened in 1969, and it became a place for Albanian Muslims in Australia to express their religion, as well as providing a sense of community and unification.

"Over the years the mosque has been used not only for worship, but also for wedding services, religious education, funeral services, meetings, tours and also social gatherings," says Indira Kulafi, who is part of the AAIS Women's Committee.

ALARMING FIGURES ON SMOKE ALARMS

Working smoke alarms were present in just half of the Yarra homes where a fire occurred last year, according to Metropolitan Fire Brigade figures. And only one in six Victorians are sleeping in bedrooms with smoke alarms.

It's time to get serious about fire safety. Make sure you have the right smoke alarm solution for your home, and check that each of your smoke alarms is in good working order.

MFB's smoke alarm tips

 Install smoke alarms in all bedrooms and living areas, including hallways and stairs.



- Each month, test smoke alarms by pressing the test button.
- Each year, vacuum all smoke alarms to clean the vents, and change batteries in any nine volt battery-operated alarms.
- After 10 years, replace smoke alarms regardless of the type.

 Install interconnected smoke alarms, so that when any alarm activates, all smoke alarms will sound.

FIFTY YEARS IN FITZROY'S CORNER

Most people remember 1969 as the year we landed on the moon, but it was also a big year for people power in Fitzroy.

The Fitzroy Residents Association (FRA) was formed to push back against planned demolitions and to help preserve the unique qualities of a storied suburb. Former Deputy Prime Minister Brian Howe served as the FRA's first chairperson.

Fitzroy is special because it has a strong sense of place that captures the interest and imagination of residents and visitors

With the FRA celebrating its 50th anniversary, current chairperson Martin Brennan is reflecting on some of the group's biggest achievements. None loom larger in the public's imagination than the successful 1994 campaign to save the Fitzroy Swimming Pool. The FRA has also campaigned for important community welfare services, and against what they see as excessive or inappropriate development.

"Fitzroy is special because it has a strong sense of place that captures the interest and imagination of residents and visitors," he says. "We all become part of that sense of place and what Fitzroy reflects in terms of its diversity, interests, passions and ideas. That's the fabric that makes up Fitzroy."

Martin believes that healthy dialogue between Council and community leads to "outcomes that benefit the city and its residents." He also notes that these connections "need to be worked on, not only by Council, but by the people who live in a city." That's why we're so fortunate to have an organisation like FRA helping to drive the conversation.

- 19 Victoria Street, Fitzroy These apartments retain the distinctive exterior of the Universal Theatre, a much-loved comedy venue that operated from 1970s-1990s.
- 251 Brunswick Street, Fitzroy - The Alimentari Eatery and Delicatessen occupies a remarkable corner building dating back to the Victorian era.


